Transition and safeguarding audit outcomes: learning briefing



Why did we carry out the audit?

- To evaluate and reflect on practice
- To learn from experience
- To inform multi-agency practice development and strengthen multi-agency working

What was the criteria for the audit?

- Must be aged 17¹/₂ 25 years
- Must have been involved in a safeguarding enquiry in the 12 months preceding the audit
- Must have been multi-agency involvement

About the ten young people selected for the audit

- Seven were female and three were male.
- Two were aged 18, one aged 19, five aged 20 and two aged 21.
- The ethnicities are: White for five, Not Stated for four and Mixed/Multiple Ethnic Group for one.
- The type of abuse was neglect or acts of omission for three, physical abuse for two, sexual abuse for two, psychological abuse for two and domestic abuse for one.
- The cause of risk was individuals known to the young people in six audits and the service provider in four audits.
- The location of risk was a mental health hospital for four, own home for three, in the community for two and in a hospital for one.

What were the key themes identified?

- Making Safeguarding Personal
- Professional curiosity and holistic view
- Management of ongoing risk
- Multi-agency working
- Quality of case recording

What is Making Safeguarding Personal (MSP)?

- A personalised approach that ensures safeguarding processes are carried out with, and not to, the Adult.
- A practice that focuses on meaningful improvement to circumstances and not just on the process, investigation and conclusion.
- An approach that enables practitioners, families, teams, and Safeguarding Adults Boards to know what difference has been made.

Professional curiosity

Professional curiosity is the skill of understanding and exploring what is happening for the Adult, rather than making assumptions or accepting things at face value. Being professionally curious is necessary to fully understand a situation and risks to an Adult which are not always immediately obvious.
